ANOTHER HOSPITAL SUCCESS STORY

Two-year old Reagan Harwood is a ball of happy energy. She loves to play with toys and has a smile for everyone she meets. Just like most toddlers she is fast moving and into everything! Unfortunately, all that energy was at work on a January afternoon, ten days before her second birthday. It took only seconds for Reagan to pull a pan of searing-hot bacon grease off of the stove-top, which caused second and third-degree burns to her face, chest and arms.

Her mother, Rhiannon, who received some burn-care education during lifeguard training in her youth, immediately removed Reagan's footie pajamas and applied water to the burns. She then called for an ambulance, which took them to the local hospital in Manchester, New Hampshire.

"When we arrived at the hospital, their top pediatrician came to examine Reagan," says Rhiannon. "He took one look and said her injuries were too severe to be properly treated at this hospital. Then he said, 'I have a

daughter, and if this had happened to her, I'd want her to be treated at Shriners-Boston."



The hospital placed a phone call to Shriners Hospitals for Children-Boston and Reagan was on her way. Upon arriving at Shriners, nurses met Reagan and her mother at the ambulance and whisked them up to the 8th floor for emergency treatment. The bacon grease had caused a severe thermal burn, which melted Reagan's pajamas into the skin on her arm and removed several layers of skin. The Shriners-Boston team quickly removed all of the remaining bacon grease from Reagan's body and then began to treat her wounds.

While the medical staff worked, the child life staff provided Reagan with toys to play with to keep her mind occupied. "The staff came in with a huge pillowcase filled with a homemade quilt, toys, books, and CDs with lullabies," Rhiannon remembers. "And a nurse came in with an iPad full of fun apps to keep Reagan busy—a virtual piano for her to play and bubbles that she could pop as they floated across the screen

The hospital staff also supported Reagan's parents—helping them fill out paperwork, explaining Reagan's wounds and treatment in layman's terms, and providing every bit of comfort possible to Rhiannon, who never left Reagan's side during her three-day stay. "The nurses arranged for a cot to be placed beside her hospital bed for us to sleep on, and let me shower in the locker room. They even let us do a load of laundry and prepared a bottle for Reagan when she woke up crying at 3 a.m."

While at Shriners, Reagan formed a particular attachment to, an administrative assistant on the eighth floor where Reagan received most of her treatment. H is also a burn survivor. It's not uncommon for the patients to form special bonds with the staff during their time at the hospital. When Reagan returned for outpatient treatment some weeks later, the assistant made it a point to drop in and check on his new friend.

Reagan sustained the most severe burns to her arm and the area around her eye. Before discharging her, Shriners-Boston staff showed Reagan's parents how to properly care for her wounds—how to dress them and what to look for to ensure they were healing properly. The burn specialists taught Reagan's parents how best to care for her skin during healing and afterward. They also informed them about the medical options she may have when she gets older, such as skin grafts to stretch the skin on her burned arm to increase mobility as Reagan continues to grow.

Almost a year after the incident, Reagan is flourishing, and is still the same bright and happy child she was before the burn occurred. The scar on her face is a mere trace of what it once was, a testament to her mother's fast-acting actions in the moments before the ambulance arrived.

Rhiannon credits the doctors and nurses at Shriners-Boston for Reagan's comprehensive treatment and the assistance and education that she and Reagan's father received during the process. She hopes that Reagan's story will help increase burn awareness and education.

"People don't ever think this will happen to them," she says. "I watch my child like a hawk—I never thought this could happen to her. Reagan's experience proved how necessary it is to know about immediate burn treatment. Reagan had such a severe burn; we were totally in the dark about how to care for it, but the doctors and nurses took us all under their wing. We are so grateful."

KISMET's "Road Runners" are in need of drivers to transport our children to the Shriners Hospitals. If you have the time and can help, please reply to this request and call me. (John 516-301-5189). If you are presently a driver please encourage new drivers to join!

As Shriners we agree that it's "all about the children" so turning away a family because we don't have a driver should never be an option. The responsibility to transport children to our Hospitals is KISMET's most important commitment. The driving involves picking up a vehicle from Enterprise and driving the family to the Shriners Hospital in Philadelphia hospital. There is normally a driver and a "shot gun". There is no cost to you and transportation is provided. As a new driver we will arrange for you to go with an experienced driver. We will work with you to get comfortable. In the past the drivers became teams. The drive time is around three hours so it's nice to have a co-driver you have something in common with. Unfortunately the demand for drivers is erratic. At the present time we have several children who have had surgery and need a weekly check up!

Over the years our Road Runners have done a outstanding job in transporting our children.



FROM THE IMPERIAL POTENTATE

Membership continues to be our number one priority, and needs to be the top priority at all 195 Shrine temples! We have too few temples showing positive gains, and many with membership decreasing below 1,000. We can turn this decline around, but it will take extra effort, with each one of us focusing on recruiting, retaining and mentoring both the nobles and the ladies.

It is very upsetting to see our membership numbers drop below 300,000, as they have this year.

It also makes me very sad to report that, so far, we have not been able to bring amity to the situation with our Masonic brothers in Arkansas and South Carolina.

We want to assure you this is not due to a lack of trying to negotiate with the Grand Masters of these two states by the leadership of Shriners International.

We have good relationships with the majority of the Grand Masters. In fact, at last year's Imperial Session we had 24 Grand Masters and Past Grand Masters on the stage with me when I asked the representatives to table item #6 on the call, which was a request by Arkansas Shriners to separate from the Grand Lodge of Arkansas. The Grand Masters present at last year's Imperial Session all promised to work with Shriners International to solve the issue in Arkansas, which has, apparently, been festering for over a decade. Of course, we will continue to work toward a solution, but we are concerned that the issue could become a serious problem at the 139th Imperial Session in Indianapolis. The reality is that these disputes – and this one is complex, but basically centers around which organization's bylaws (Shriners International or the local Grand Lodge) must be followed in specific circumstances involving members –

The base of Master Masons that Shrinedom has to draw from in these two states continues to decrease at an alarming rate:

- 1. Arkansas 1990 = 38,929 less loss of 24,500 2012= 14,429 members (loss of 63%)
- 2. South Carolina 1990 = 67,576 less loss of 27,649 2012 = 39,927 members (loss of 42%)!

In fact the number of Masons has declined, just like the number of Shriners. We might all do well to focus on strengthening one another, and on our positive missions and goals for the sake of the future.

We talk a lot about our bonds of brotherhood – We suggest that be our main focus as we work to solve our differences and increase our memberships.

Remember that "failure is NOT an option" to bringing peace and harmony to ALL Grand Lodges!

Katrina was born with arthrogryposis; arthrogryposis is one of the most unknown orthopaedic conditions. It is a nonprogressive muscle disorder causing multiple joint contractures (limitation in the range of motion of a joint) at birth.



NO PLANE, NO GAIN-PATIENT AIRLIFT SERVICES

A diverse group of businesspeople in the Northeast depend on airplanes to support their enterprises, but they also regularly use their aircraft to help cancer patients and others in need of medical help. The grateful passengers, who often would otherwise be unable to reach treatment, think of their business flight donors as very special "PALS."

These businesspeople volunteer for Patient AirLift Services (PALS), a non-profit 501(c)(3) based in Farmingdale, NY. The organization coordinates mercy flights to far-away medical destinations, and volunteer pilots or aircraft owners pay the entire cost of each flight.

"I just flew a 16-year-old girl who had brain surgery," said Don Catalano, president of ReOptimizer of Long Island. "Through PALS, we were able to get her from Long Island to Toledo, OH in two-and-one-half hours, versus a 12-hour car drive that would have been arduous for this young lady."



Shawn Lyden, of Coastal Realty Capital in Maine, often uses his aircraft to support his business, which makes commercial loans throughout the Northeast, but said PALS flights can be the highlight of his week. Several years ago, he flew a young girl burned from head to toe to the Shriner's Hospital in Boston for skin grafts. As the little girl recovered and grew, additional flights enabled the girl to return to the hospital, where surgeons replaced grafts as she outgrew them. "I flew her a dozen times and by the fifth or sixth flight, we had a bond," said Lyden. "We became friends."

Ron Siegel, of Auto World Kia in East Meadow, NY, said his aircraft saves him a lot of time each year, but adds his PALS flights are the most rewarding. "The other day I flew a little boy, a heart transplant patient, and it was just great to see this little kid get better, smiling in the back seat," Siegel said.

"These businessmen and women and other volunteer pilots donate their own aircraft and time for people who need medical diagnosis, treatment or for other compassionate reasons," said Eileen Minogue, executive director of PALS. "They often say they get as much out of the flights as the patients."

PALS never charges patients for flights. "Patients often have limited financial resources or are receiving diagnosis, treatment or follow-up for acute or chronic illnesses," said Minogue. "Our volunteer pilots are extremely generous with their time, resources and talents to help those in need. Without them, PALS would not exist. They are the reason our slogan is 'Changing lives, one flight at a time.'"

"Those are the best days of my life, when I can give back using the skills God has given me with a PALS patient on board," said Catalano.
