FORMER SHC PATIENTS-WINTER ATHLETES



Name: Heidi Jo Duce, Age: 23, \Hometown: Ouray, Colorado, Sport: Snowboarding Accepting No Limits: Heidi was born without a fibula and most of the bones in her right ankle and foot, a condition known as fibular hemimelia. After undergoing surgery to remove her right leg (below the knee) at 18 months, she required a second corrective amputation when she was 19. All of her surgeries were done at Shriners Hospitals for Children in Salt Lake City. Heidi learned to snowboard at age 11 by attending the Un-Limb-ited Amputee Camp, which was started by a physical therapist from Shriners Hospitals for Children in Salt Lake City.

Fun Facts: Heidi never thought about being a competitive snowboarder, it was just fun for her. When the International Paralympic Committee announced that the sport would debut as part of the alpine skiing program in Sochi, Heidi knew that she wanted to be a part of these historic Paralympic games. Shortly after the announcement she began her quest for Sochi gold. Heidi's first competitive race was in January 2013, where she actually fell at the start, but that didn't stop her. Heidi is currently ranked in the top three in the country in the sport. In addition to snowboarding, Heidi also enjoys rock climbing, ice climbing and white water kayaking.



Name: Dan McCoy, Age: 19, Hometown: Cheswick, Pennsylvania, Sport: Sled Hockey
Accepting No Limits: Dan was born with spina bifida, a birth defect caused by the incomplete formation of vertebrae, and
hydrocephalus, a medical condition in which there is an abnormal accumulation of fluid in the brain. Dan was treated at
Shriners Hospitals for Children in Erie, PA, where the staff also helped to introduce him to the sport of sled hockey at age 5.
Shriners Hospitals for Children started one of the first U.S. sled hockey teams in Erie, PA and soon followed with six more
teams in the Northeast.

Fun Facts: Dan has been playing sled hockey for 14 years and has been a member of the US National Sled Hockey Team for three years. He helped Team USA win a Gold medal in the 2012 International Paralympic Committee Ice Sledge World Championship in Hamar, Norway as well as in the 2012 World Sledge Hockey Challenge in Calgary. Team USA took the silver medal at the 2013 International Paralympic Committee Ice Sledge World Championship in Goyang City, South Korea. Additionally, Dan has been playing with the Pittsburgh Mighty Penguins sled hockey team ever since his introduction to the sport and is currently Captain of the team. Dan attends the University of Pittsburgh where he is pursuing a degree in rehabilitation science and sports medicine. In addition to sled hockey, Dan enjoys rowing and cycling.



Name: Joe Dertinger, Age: 18, Hometown: Waconia, Minnesota, Sport: Downhill Skiing Accepting No Limits: When Joe was 15 months old, he had surgery at Shriners Hospitals for Children in Minneapolis, MN to remove his right leg beliow the knee and to separate two fingers that were webbed together. Two months later, he received his first prosthetic leg. When Joe was 5 his prosthetist at Shriners Hospitals for Children mentioned the Courage Center, a community based service that aids in the rehabilitation process for people with a disability. The Courage Center close to Joe's hometown had an adaptive ski program, which is where Joe first took to the slopes.

Fun Facts: Joe has been competitively racing for the past seven years. He doesn't use adaptive ski equipment, just regular skis and poles. In April 2013, Joe was named the Men's Junior National Champion. He is the fastest skier with a disability in the US under the age of 18. He competes with fellow skiers with disabilities and against able-bodied skiers on his high school varsity team.



Name: Nicole Roundy, Age: 27, Hometown: Park City, Utah, Sport: Snowboarding Accepting No Limits: In 1994, at just eight years old, Nicole was diagnosed with osteogenic sarcoma, a form of bone cancer. Later that year she lost her right leg above the knee and continued aggressive chemotherapy treatment. Shriners Hospitals for Children — Salt Lake City made all of her prosthetics until she was 19 and introduced her to the sport during their Un-Limb-ited Amputee Camp. She wouldn't be on the slopes today without Shriners Hospitals for Children.

Fun Facts: Nicole first tried adapted skiing, but it wasn't for her. Snowboarding was more of a challenge but it was where she found her true calling. Nicole races boardercross. Her first team was with able-bodied athletes who pushed her to be the competitor she is today. In 2012, she received a Bachelors degree in Business Management and currently works in the outdoor industry.



Name: Andrew Haraghey, Age: 18, Hometown: Enfield, Connecticut, Sport: Downhill Skiing Accepting No Limits: As a baby Andrew was diagnosed with viral encephalitis. This brought upon swelling of the brain, which resulted in a diagnosis of spastic diplegic cerebral palsy, which in his case also causes stiffness in the legs and low muscle tone. Andrew slowly recovered the function in his arms and hands but his legs never recovered. Andrew is a patient at Shriners Hospital for Children in Springfield, MA. His doctors here fit him for leg braces to help him walk and encouraged him to explore the world of adaptive sports. The doctors at Shriners Hospitals for Children in Springfield have truly been there for Andrew every step of the way. Two years ago, Andrew required foot surgery and a year later needed a screw in his foot removed during the ski season. His doctors knew how important skiing was to him, so they rushed Andrew in to get him back on the slopes as soon as possible.

Fun Facts: When Andrew was seven he took his first skiing lesson. After three years Andrew became an independent skier. Due to the cerebral palsy, walking and running were a challenge, but skiing gave him new freedom. Andrew recently even won a silver medal competing against racers without disabilities at Copper Mountain, CO in December 2013. In addition to skiing, Andrew has mastered snowboarding, water skiing, wheelchair tennis, baseball and kayaking!

BOSTON FIRE FIGHTERS—HEROES TO THE LAST

In regular visits to Shriners Hospitals, Boston firefighter Michael R. Kennedy would plop himself down among grievously injured boys and girls from all over the world, grab a toy, and coax even the shyest child back to what kids are meant to do, to play and have fun.

"He would get into a roomful of kids and he was just one of them," said Phil Skrabut, a firefighter on Engine 17 in Dorchester, who served with Kennedy on the board of the Boston Firefighters Burn Foundation, which organizes visits and holds events for burn victims.

Kennedy, 33, a Marine veteran who served in Iraq and who was one of the first responders at last year's Boston Marathon bombing, died Wednesday with Boston Fire Lieutenant Edward J. Walsh Jr., after becoming trapped while battling a nine-alarm blaze in the Back Bay. He had intended to run the Marathon next month and had been assigned bib No. 29384.



Long before Kennedy gave his life protecting his city, he gave his time, lots of it, to quiet community work.

Kennedy became involved with the Burn Foundation from the moment he joined the force 6½ years ago, according to several members who worked with him. The group organized bowling excursions and Christmas parties for hospital patients. Mike pitched at the foundation's whiffleball games for the kids, on the Esplanade.

In 2007, Kennedy, a Roslindale native, began mentoring a 7-year-old boy through Big Brothers Big Sisters of Massachusetts Bay, beginning a relationship that would last the rest of his life.

Last month, Kennedy led a Boston Fire Department contingent to Rhode Island to donate blood and join the bone marrow registry, in honor of a child with leukemia.

Friends say Kennedy had a gift for connecting with children hurt by fire.

"Mike didn't see injuries; he just saw a kid that wanted to have fun," Skrabut said. "The kids weren't shy around him. He would pick up a toy and start playing as if it were his toy, and play with a kid as if he was the same age."

Katie Siwy, a Shriners occupational therapist who knew Kennedy through the foundation events, said the visits help "create a normal environment in a hospital setting."

"They come to spend time with the kids at a time they are needing friendship," she said. "He took his own time to come in and cheer these kids up."

Boston firefighter Steve Turley, a fellow foundation board member, said Kennedy exemplified the organization's mission: to ease the suffering and hardship of burn victims and their families.

"I don't think any of us are accepting that he is gone," Turley said. "He'll live on for a long time with us."

About seven years ago, Kennedy approached Big Brothers Big Sisters about becoming a mentor, said Deborah Krause, the organization's vice president of external relations and community engagement.

"Mike came to us after he was home from Iraq and was feeling very grateful about his own life and the blessing he had," Krause said. Kennedy was matched at the time with Genie Morelus's then 7-year-old son, Alex. "He meant a lot of us," Morelus, 37, of Milton said softly, in an interview Thursday. "I'm so thankful, so thankful he came into our life.

"If something happened at my son's school, Mike was there," she said. "Family event, he's there. I have to let the world know he is a wonderful big brother and if he would have had kids he would have been the best dad you could ever have. Always there for you. Raining, pouring, snowing, he's right there. Right there."

A perfect day for Mike and Alex could be a Boston Celtics game or an outing to Six Flags amusement park, a burger at Five Guys,



and "boy's games" on the Xbox game console Kennedy gave Alex as a Christmas gift, Morelus said

"Things that I couldn't provide for Alex, Mike did it," she said. "He got an Xbox for him. He also got him shoes I couldn't afford, and things I couldn't do, he did it for him."

Alex, now 14 and in the eighth grade, is struggling with his mentor's death. He doesn't want to eat. He only wants to sleep. He tells his mother his head hurts.

"I told him — I say: 'You know, Alex, the best gift you could give me is when you graduate from high school, that high school diploma belongs to Mike Kennedy. Stay in school, finish school, and give him that gift. That is what you can give him. Give him that high school diploma, because he deserves it."

Edward "Eddie" Walsh Jr. was always among the first to enter a burning building. That was the case again on Wednesday, March 26 when the Boston Fire Lieutenant braved his way into a 4-story brick building at 298 Beacon Street. Within 3 minutes, they called 'mayday', indicating they were trapped. Deputy Fire Chief Joseph Finn later said is appears a front window in the basement broke out, blowing the fire back at the men. Walsh's body was pulled from that basement nearly five hours later, by the men from his firehouse. AFGHAN GIRL INJURED IN WAR GETS NEW ARM

During an occupational therapy session Wednesday at Shriners Hospital for Children in Downtown Los Angeles, Shah Bibi carefully removed two snug rubber bands around a doll's hair with her new prosthetic arm. She slowly tied the laces on a large shoe placed in front of her and struggled to jump rope with her occupational therapist.

But it was hitting a beach ball on a cone with a plastic baseball bat — which she did with ease and strength — that clearly thrilled the 7-year-old Afghan girl the most. Shah Bibi, whose last name is being withheld for her privacy and safety, lost part of her right arm and an eye after picking up a grenade last summer in her native, war-torn Afghanistan.

She was brought to Southern California in December by the Los Angeles-based Children of War Foundation to receive months of donated medical treatment. She will head back home Monday to reunite with her family. The new arm "is really good for writing, and for hitting the ball, and for braiding the doll's hair," Shah Bibi, who has acquired a taste for American singers Rihanna and



Katy Perry in recent months, said through a translator Wednesday. "I like it (overall) for what it is."

Ammal Najjar, executive director of the Los Angeles-based nonprofit<u>Children of War Foundation</u>, wasn't sure this day would ever come.

She first heard of Shah Bibi's plight after she received an email in August from an American nurse who was helping care for the girl at a NATO hospital in northern Kabul.

"When I look back at it now and I see her today, it's incredible. It's a miracle," Najjar, said. "I felt like she's meant to go on and do better things now, seeing her with her new arm. There's a reason why she was spared... She's going to go home completely transformed."

Shah Bibi, who lost a sibling in last summer's explosion and had to be dug out of the rubble, wanted more than anything else to have a new arm, Najjar said. When she arrived, doctors weren't sure that fitting her with a prosthetic arm would be necessary since some people fare better without one. But Shah Bibi was so eager to have a new arm, she said. She wanted to feel normal.

"It's brought her self-confidence back because we didn't see her smile until she had her arm," she said.

Shriners Hospital for Children picked up the tab for much of her medical care, including Shah Bibi's prosthetic arm and accompanying occupational therapy; Dr. Mark Urata, chief of the division of plastic and reconstructive surgery of USC's Keck School of Medicine, removed some shrapnel from her body and some infected teeth. Children of War picked up most of her other expenses, including her

visa, airfare and anesthesia, Najjar said.

Shah Bibi was fitted with a somewhat low-tech prosthetic so if something breaks while she's back home, it won't be impossible to get it fixed, said Dr. Phoebe Scott-Wyard, medical director of the Child Amputee Prosthetics Project at Shriners Hospital for Children.

Children of War also hopes to bring her back to the United States regularly since she's expected to outgrow the prosthetic about once a year.

The girl has been going through extensive training with occupational therapist Vivian Yip in recent weeks — first with a very short-term arm and now with a more long-term one — since she won't have access to that in Afghanistan, Scott-Wyard said.

"She's very motivated. She's a sweet, sweet girl and it's been a wonderful partnership with Children of War Foundation," she said.

On Wednesday afternoon, Shah Bibi — who loves to color — used her new prosthetic arm in a private painting session with artist Dayvd Whaley at Galerie Michael, a fine-art space in Beverly Hills.

Shah Bibi has been staying with a host family in Orange County while recuperating and learning how to read and write English at an Islamic school in Anaheim that is donating its services. Since her remote village in northern Afghanistan is occupied by Taliban forces, who do not permit girls to study, this is an experience Shah Bibi would not have at home, Najjar said.

"Being able to read and write the past four months has really changed her," she said. "It's opened her mind up."

Shah Bibi heads home to her family on Monday, though she will return to Southern California in coming summers for additional medical procedures, including receiving a prosthetic eye, Najjar said.

"I have a 2-year-old at home and I couldn't imagine if this were to happen to him and we weren't able to get the help," she said.
